WORKSHOP ON CENTRAL ASIA'S PARTICIPATION IN GLOBAL SUPPLY CHAINS AND ITS IMPLICATIONS TO DEVELOPMENT POLICIES

12-14 November 2013, Tokyo, Japan

Despite the challenges of transition toward a market-oriented system, Central Asia has emerged as an important hub for global integration. Although intra-regional trade among the Central Asian economies has remained small, the existence of diverse resource endowments and many economic commonalities provide an opportunity for trade diversification and specialization. Central Asia's unique position in the Eurasian continent, one of the most dynamic regions in the world today, also offers tremendous opportunities for cross-border trade and capital flows.

Indeed these new forces of globalization and integration can fundamentally change trade patterns in many Central Asian countries and lead to paradigm shifts in development policies. One such force is global supply chain and production network. By organizing their production to global supply chains, countries can benefit from exposures to new technology, easy access to foreign markets, and the integration between local and multinational enterprises. Global supply chains and production networks can also help countries support growth through strategic alliances and joint ventures of domestic firms with their foreign counterparts.

Unfortunately, the lack of government capacity has kept many economies in Central Asia from reaping the benefits of global integration. One challenge is to ensure that benefits from global supply chains and global production networks lead to sustained economic development. In particular, countries have to make sure that they can adapt to these evolving economic settings as global chains expand, by implementing policies and strategies consistent with their development goals. In this context, the ADB Institute and the CAREC Institute are jointly organizing a Workshop on Central Asia's Participation in Global Supply Chains and Its Implications to Development Policies on 12 – 14 November 2013 in Tokyo, Japan.

This three-day workshop aims at examining the growth of global supply chains and their implications for policy development and strategies in the economies of Central Asia. Its objectives are to introduce basic concepts of global supply chains (GSC) and global production networks (GPN) and to analyse roles of GSC and GPN in formulating development strategies in CAREC region.

This Workshop is expected to deliver the following outputs: (i) improved capacity of government officials on the basic concepts of GSC and GPN; (ii) sharing of best regulatory practices among Asian developing countries for integrating domestic industries with global production networks and supply chains; and (iii) concrete policy recommendations for promoting GPN and GSC.

Participants to this Workshop are targeted at high-level officials from the policy and regulatory agencies in CAREC member countries. Private sector representatives from selected CAREC countries will also be invited to share their views on GSC and GPN in the CAREC region.
