## Review of Status of Trade Policy Commitments End-2014 Commitments

- Tariff-tax measures (#1-5) closely related to WTO accession
- Capacity building (#7) and knowledge sharing (#8-9)
- Strong implementation record

- Strong record on WTO accession-related measures (#1-2)
- But NJC-related measures seem challenging (#3-5, #7)
- What is the status of NJC permanent secretariats?

Likely similar outcomes as for end-2015 commitments

## TPSAP Achievements and Challenges Main Themes

#### **Achievements**

- Afghanistan, Kazakhstan, and Tajikistan joined WTO
- Almost all countries reported setting up NJC secretariats
- Commitments on tariffs, SPS, and TBT largely met
- Knowledge sharing commitments generally met

#### Challenges

- Azerbaijan, Turkmenistan, and Uzbekistan not yet WTO members
- But most commitments related to outputs by NJCs not met
- But commitments related to trade in services largely not met
- But commitments requiring bilateral agreements on labor movements largely not met

## **Implementation Bottlenecks**

- Ownership: How well aligned are TPSAP commitments with countries' trade policy agenda?
- Relevance: Even if ownership in place, are trade policy commitments sufficiently relevant for member countries?
- Capacity: And even with ownership and relevance in place, do countries have the ability to implement the commitments?
