



Draft IRU Resolution on road safety, in support of the UN Decade of Action for Road Safety

The International Road Transport Union (IRU), representing truck, bus, coach and taxi operators through its 180 Members in 74 countries on 5 continents,

- The IRU Road Safety Charter was unanimously adopted and signed by all IRU Member Associations during the 29th IRU World Congress on 22-24 April 2004 in





IRU efforts on improving road safety acknowledged by the UN Road Safety Resolution adopted by the UN General

United Nations Distr.: General General Assembly Sixty-eighth session Agenda item 12 AGREED Improving global road safety The General Assembly, PP1 Recalling its resolutions 57/309 of 22 May 2003, 58/9 of 5 November 2003, 58/289 of 14 April 2004, 60/5 of 26 October 2005, 62/244 of 31 March 2008, 64/255 of 2 March 2010 and 66/260 of 19 April 2012 on improving global road PP2 Recalling also the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development, held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, from 20 to 22 June 2012, and its outcome document, entitled "The future we want", in which Member States took nto account road safety as part of their efforts to achieve sustainable development, PP3 Recalling further the special event to follow up efforts made achieving the Millennium Development Goals, convened by the President of the General Assembly on 25 September 2013, and its outcome document, PP4 Having considered the note by the Secretary-General transmitting the t on improving global road safety and the recommendations contained therein PP5 Noting that road traffic injuries are a major public health and development problem that has a broad range of social and economic consequences which, if unaddressed, may affect the sustainable development of countries and hinder progress towards the Millennium Development Goals, PP6 Expressing its concern that the number of road traffic deaths still remains ceptably high with an estimated 1.24 million lives lost in 2010², and that only 7% of the world's population is covered by adequate laws that address all behavioural risk factors, including the non-use of helmets, safety belts and child restraints, driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs, inappropriate and excessive speed, and inappropriate use of cell phones, including texting, while PP7 Also expressing its concern that worldwide half of all road traffic deaths involve pedestrians, motorcyclists and cyclists, and that in some developing countries there are inadequate infrastructure and insufficient policies in place to

PP20 Acknowledging a number of other important international efforts on road safety, including the development by the International Road Transport Union of harmonized and internationally recognized standards for vocational training of road transport professionals.

Transport ministers approve Quality Charter for road freight

Major step towards harmonisation of conditions in the Pan-European road haulage market

A Quality Charter for international road haulage operations has been approved by the transport ministers of the European member countries of the International Transport Forum at the OECD.

The Quality Charter establishes qualification standards for companies, managers and drivers and will enter into force on 1 January 2016. It applies to pan-European road haulage operations under the Multilateral Quota system established in 1974 by the European Conference of Ministers of Transport (ECMT), which evolved into the International Transport Forum (ITF) in 2006.
