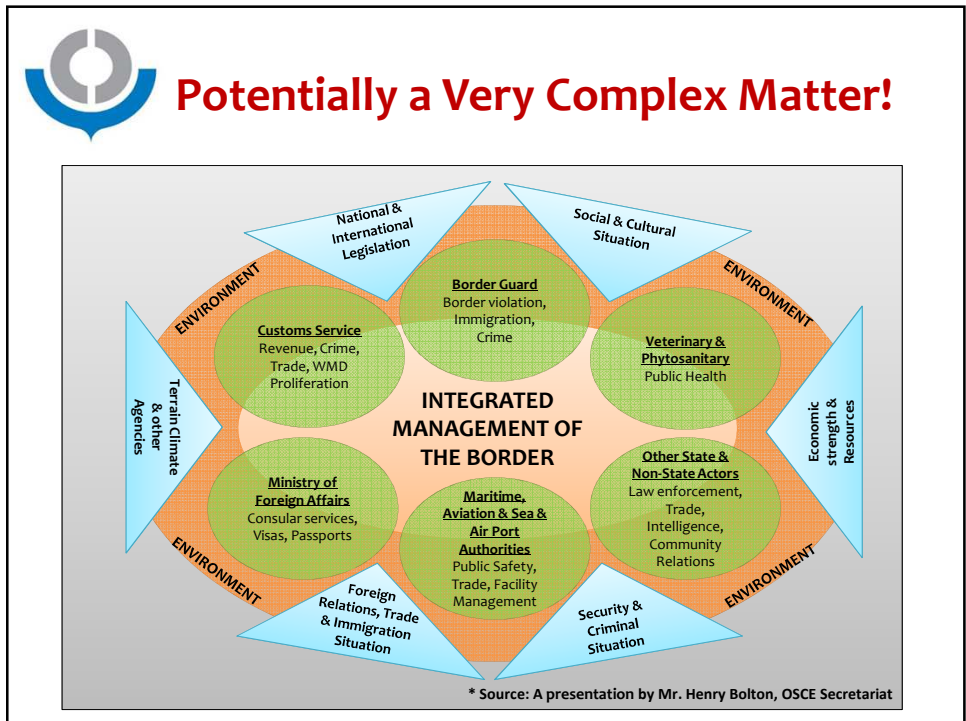

But could be rewarding ...

- “Even as customs procedures become more similar, many countries still find their supply chain performance constrained by other border agencies.” (WB LPI 2012)
- “Other measures significantly contributing to an increase in trade flows are (...) *co-operation between border agencies within the country (internal) and with neighbouring countries (external).*” (OECD Trade Policy Working Paper 118)
- “Customs and other government agencies play a pivotal role in the facilitation of international trade. Besides having to efficiently manage the clearance and ensure the security of international cross-border movements of goods and conveyances, these organizations also have to apply coordinated cross-border management principles to foster cooperation and to coordinate their respective regulatory activities.” (UNECE TFIG)

Changing border context: Need for CBM

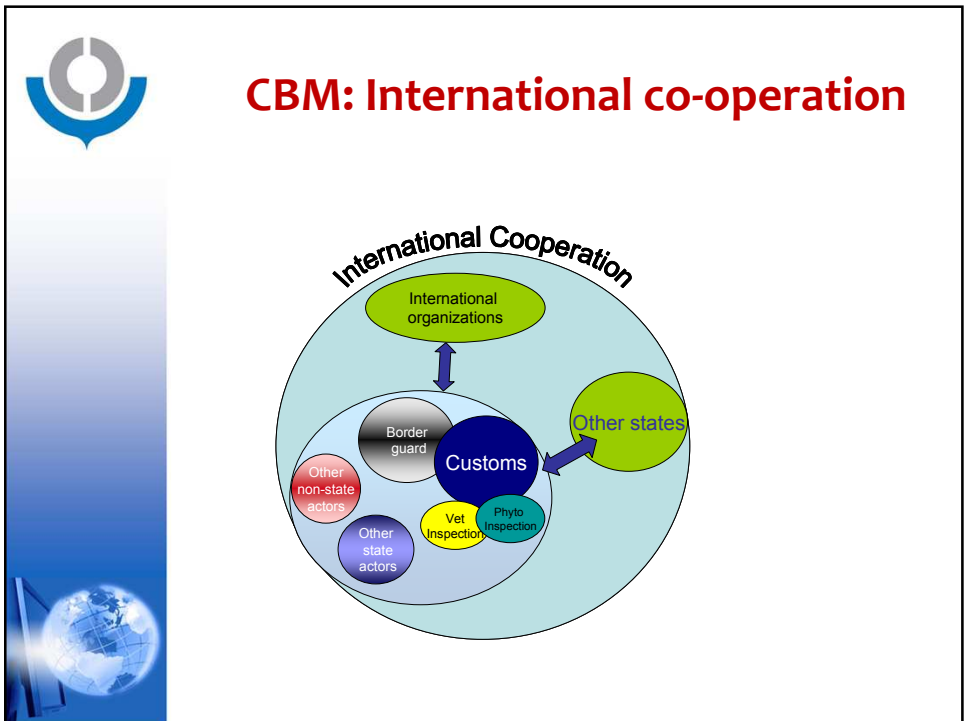

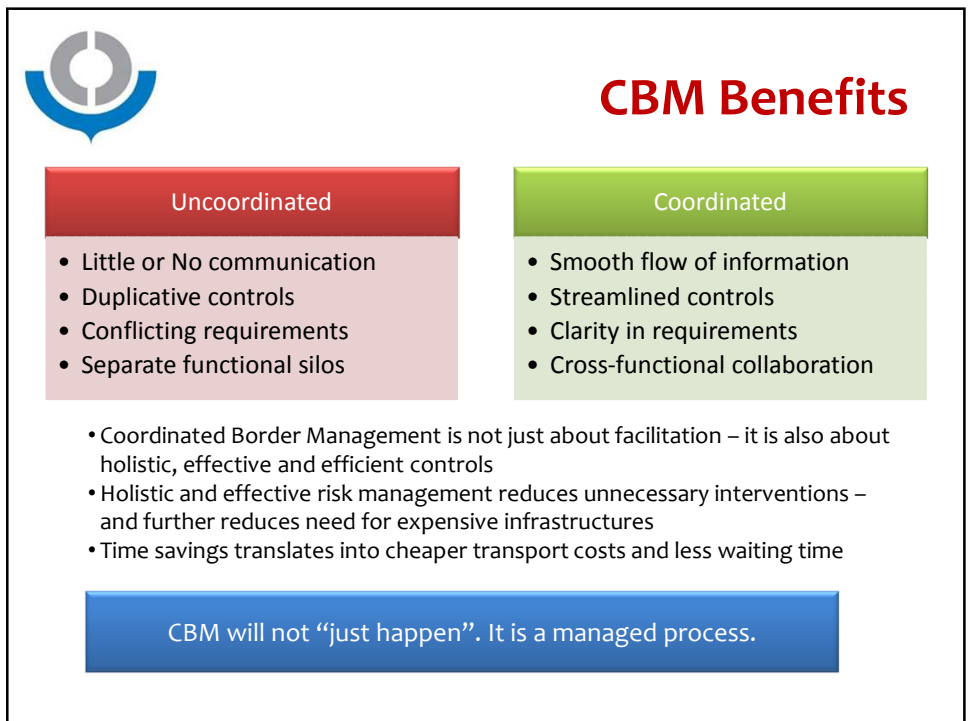
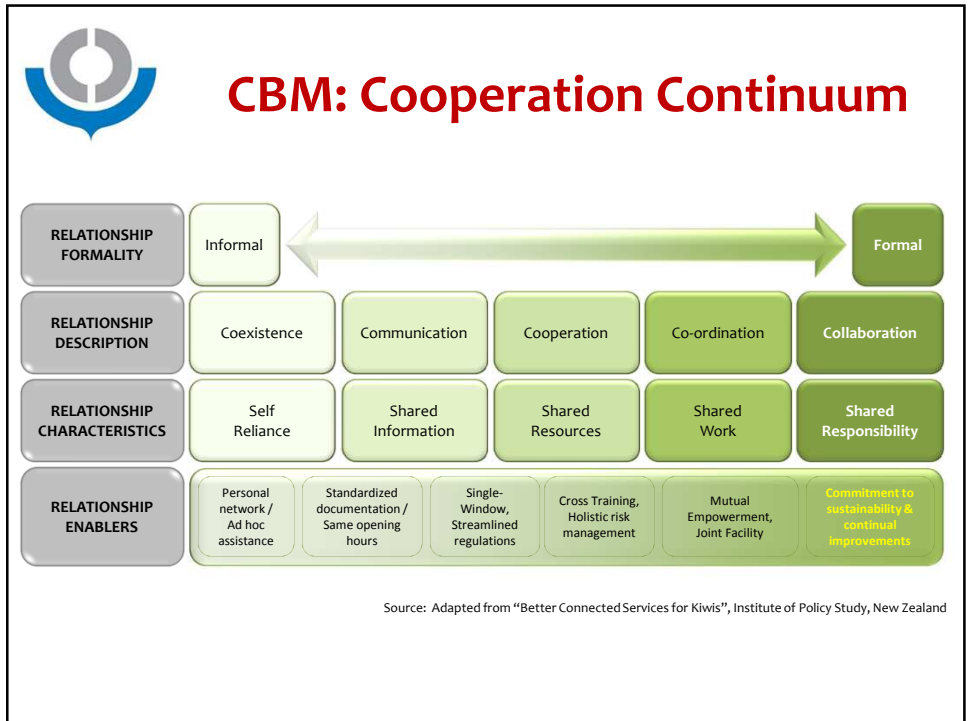


Coordinated Border management

- Refers to:
 - The coordinated approach by border control agencies, both **domestic** and **international**, in the context of **seeking greater efficiencies** over managing trade and travel flows, while **maintaining a balance with compliance requirements**









Implementing CBM : Challenges in co-operation


- Identification of common areas for better co-ordination and resources management
- Removal of areas of overlap and redundancy
- Co-operation with Trade and other stakeholders

- Sustainability & Continual Improvements


In essence


