








UN/CEFACT International Trade Transaction Model





Recommendation No. 4: National Trade Facilitation Bodies

- Recommends that Governments establish and support national trade facilitation bodies with balanced private and public sector participation
- Specific purposes of NTFB could entail:
 - Facilitating inter-agency coordination
 - Developing new national policies mapped against existing international, standardized and harmonized methods
 - Promoting existing facilitation solutions and helping to implement them
 - Contributing to the work of established international organizations

Single Window UNECE Recommendation 33

Recommends Governments to establish Single Window for Cross Border Trade

Defines features:

- ... one time submission
- ..of standardized information and documents
- sharing of information amongst government agencies;
- <u>coordinated controls and inspections</u> of the various governmental authorities;
- Allow <u>payment</u> of duties and other charges;
- Be a <u>source</u> of trade related government information.

 - Business Requirements out for Public Review,
 - User Guide under development
- Multi-Modal Transport (MMT) Reference Data Model
- WCO Data Model support
- Recommendation for ensuring legally significant trusted transboundary electronic interaction
- Directory Production: UN/EDIFACT, CCL and UN/LOCODE every 6 months



Example: Greece

UNECE Technical Assistance for Trade Facilitation Implementation

Since 2012, Greece has improved its ranking in the World Bank Doing Business study by 39 positions from position 100 to 61 in 2014.

The competitive position of Greece in the Logistic Performance Index has improved by 25 positions. The concrete results for Customs are overwhelming with an improvement by 52 positions, from 94 to 42.

The time to export and import has been reduced by 25% and 44% respectively.

The cost to export and import has gone down by approximately 10%.

Impact of the work – some examples

Recommendation 25 UN EDIFACT: The Global EDI Standard for trade. The 12 largest European ports alone process more of 1.8 billion messages annually based on UN/EDIFACT.

UN/CCL Core Component Library: The UN/CCL, together with the UNECE Trade Data Element Directory (UN/TDED), forms the basis for the World Customs Organization (WCO) Data Model for the exchange of Customs related information world wide.

Recommendation 16 UN/LOCODE: Use of UN/LOCODE helped reduce the costs of imports for a single company in China by almost USD 200 million per year!

Recommendation 33 Single Window: 71 economies around the world, including UNECE and non UNECE Member States, have established "Single Windows" (SW) using this recommendation as a basis (World Bank Doing Business Report Data 2014). The use of Single Window saves in some of these countries up to 10% of the value of goods (World Bank study)

Trade Facilitation Implementation Guide (TFIG): Over half a billion hits per month!

Support to the Greek Government: Development of the Greek TF Roadmap – reduced ranking in Logistics Performance Index from 49 to 24 in two years.
