1. Reforms on Customs Legislations and Regulations

- 2008 Customs Law is in a process of revision and the Final Draft was submitted to the Ministry of Finance at the moment.
- Next steps are that the Draft should be presented to the Cabinet for its approval and then tabled to the Parliament for its readings.
- The main changes to the existing law introduction and development of single window system, electronic data exchange, advance rulings on rules of origin, valuation and Customs tariffs, AEO and relief consignments procedures, new provisions on publication, enquiry points and opportunities to comment and information before entry into force of legal documents and detailed provisions on risk management, post-clearance audit, IPR and some other procedures such postal traffic and inward and outward processing, simplified procedures for appeal or review, and so on (all over 72 percent of the current law is to be changed)





2. Temporary measures undertaken in response to COVID-19

- Within the framework of best protection against the outbreak of coronaviruses and prevention measures, cross-border movements are partially restricted and only importation and exportation of goods and means of transport are allowed.
- The Period of Cross-Country Enhanced Preparedness Actions against the Covid-19 Pandemic was extended until 15 September 2020.
- Scheduled international flights and international railway passenger movements were suspended.
- Customs inspections are carried out only after the goods and means of transport are properly decontaminated and in separate areas classified as red, orange and green. The Customs inspectors use full and half sets of personal protective cloths and equipment.
- Limited number of special chartered flights are being arranged to locations outside Mongolia to bring Mongolian nationals back at their requests. They are isolated at special quarantine areas for 21 days. Thereafter, the Customs carries out the necessary Customs inspections.





2. COVID-19 Pandemic: Current Situation in Mongolia

- Confirmed cases: 310 (all arriving travelers)
- Death: 0
- Recovered: 216
- Monitored: 3740 (all arriving travelers)





3. Progress on ongoing projects (ADB RIBS and EU TRAM projects)

ADB RIBS (Regional Improvement of Border Services) Project Outputs are:

- Upgrading and improvement of facilities and equipment, and construction of a road at certain border crossing points (Construction of dual carriage road, additional roads and parking in Altanbulag BCP began in September 2019 and expected to be completed in Q3 of 2020. In addition to the Altanbulag BCP, ADB approved additional financing to the project to upgrade other two (Bichigt and Borshoo) BCPs on 31 August 2019.);
- (ii) Strengthening and upgrading of communication infrastructure for Customs automated information system (CAIS) (The CAIS impact assessment to identify detailed gaps was conducted and the adaptive CAIS enterprise architecture to change barriers, the roadmap and implementation plan to make CAIS compliant to the World Customs Organization Data Model standards were developed); and
- (iii) Preparatory work for Single Window (A Request for Proposal was approved by ADB in September 2019. A contract was awarded in November 2019).






CAIS was launched in 2010 under the Customs Modernization Project financed by the ADB replacing previous GAMAS system.

However, the Mongolian Customs is a main actor to implement the WTO Trade Facilitation Agreement.

In this sense, the Mongolian Customs is working closely with the TRAM to work out the Roadmap and strategic plan for implementation of the TFA, attend the National Trade Facilitation Committee Meetings, strengthen its capacity building within the framework of the WTO TFA in very general terms and translate several WCO publications such as the Transit Guidelines, the Cross-Border E-Commerce Framework of Standards, the Why & How of Performance Measurement Contracts and the Framework of Principles and Practices on Customs Professionalism.

Recently together we had released the Glossary of International Trade and Customs Terms in English and Mongolian.

3. Progress on ongoing projects (ADB RIBS and EU TRAM projects)

EU TRAM (The European Union funded "Trade Related Assistance for Mongolia) Project: TFA Categories Commitments as notified by Mongolia:

- All B and C categories are to be implemented by 2025 at least as we had notified to the WTO. However, without additional technical assistance in specific terms, these categories are not easy to be implemented by our own resources. The TRAM has very limited resources and is about to stop soon. At the moment it is not certain whether it will be further extended or not.





4. Short- to medium-term issues and proposals for CAREC CCC workplan for the CITA's RSAP 2020-2022

Proposals:

- To consider the technical assistance issues in specific terms in order to implement the B and C categories of TFA by Mongolia and other CAREC members as notified to the WTO.

If to be more specific, the Mongolian Customs is wishing a technical assistance (not a loan!) in strengthening its capacity in enquiry points, advance rulings and the Single Window, etc.
