Project Preparation

Consultants will conduct a feasibility study for

- ➤ investment in basic infrastructure upgrades and modernization of key BCPs
- ➤ development of trade and transport logistics facilities at BCPs, and
- ➤ NSW development in selected countries and a CAREC regional platform for networking of NSWs



Investment Criteria

- > strong country ownership
- > accession to cross-border transit agreements
- readiness of project proposal and readiness for implementation
- > technical and economic viability
- positive due diligence results and results of safeguard assessments
- effective functioning of national joint transport and trade facilitation committees (NJCs)
- willingness of both sides to make complementary investments on a given BCP

NJC Roles and Responsibilities

- > initiating necessary policy and regulatory reforms
- coordinating effectively with related government and non-government agencies
- ensuring proper governance practices at all stages of project implementation cycle
- coordinating effectively with neighboring countries and all CAREC member countries involved in the project



NJC Roles and Responsibilities

- > appoint a coordinator to work with the consultant teams
- assign counterpart staff to facilitate the consultants' work
- provide suitable and furnished office accommodation, office equipment (e.g., printers and photocopiers), and communication facilities (e.g., telephone, fax machine) to the consultants
- provide transport (vehicles) and logistical assistance, especially for consultations with stakeholders
- provide consultants with the government reports, materials, data, and maps needed to implement the TA



NJC Roles and Responsibilities

- > supervise TA activities
- Solve any issues that may arise during implementation
- Facilitate coordination among the consultants, relevant government agencies, and other stakeholders



Consultant Tasks

- Assess technical viability of each investment, including BCP infrastructure planning, equipment, facility, proposed NSW technology, and their compatibility with local conditions such as local capacity for operation and maintenance
- Assess economic and financial viability and sustainability both at the national level and most importantly at the regional level
- Evaluate the EAs' and IAs' financial management, procurement, anticorruption, policy and legal framework, capacity, and other institutional issues and mechanisms

Consultant Tasks

- Assess poverty reduction and social impacts such as HIV/AIDS and human trafficking as potential negative impacts of trade facilitation
- Set up the necessary project implementation arrangements including audit, financial, and procurement systems and procedures
- Prepare procurement plans covering the full period of project implementation



Consultant Tasks: Safeguards

- Prepare safeguard frameworks for all countries participating in the project. If necessary, consultants may also prepare:
 - (i) environmental management plan(s) and/or environmental assessments
 - (ii) resettlement plan(s)
 - (iii) Indigenous Peoples plan(s)
 - (iv) agreed environmental and social management system arrangement
 - (v) summary poverty reduction and social strategy
 - (vi) gender action plan, and/or other applicable instruments.




What the Consultants Will Need from Participating Countries

- Implementing Agents identified by 15 April
- Single Window Technical Working Groups formed by 15 April
- Priority border crossing points identified, and supporting documentation (any engineering design and/or economic analyses prepared previously) – by 15 April
