# Functions of ERCs under the 2003 Act

#### **Core Role**

Tariff regulation, monitoring quality of service Adjudicating disputes, enforcing licensing conditions, monitoring compliance, and redressing grievances

### **Recommendatory role**

If approval is not under its jurisdiction

### **Advisory role**

Information and advice to the government on matters of importance to the sector





## **Key achievements**

- Tariff rebalancing in reduction of cross-subsidy
- Focus on consumer interests
- Transparency in assessing performance parameters
- Focus on efficiency improvement
- Increased public participation
- Commercial orientation in the functioning of utilities
- New tariff designs including a move towards MYT





## **Constraints in functioning**

- Poor information base
- Lack of financial and functional autonomy
- Delays in appointment
- Overlapping jurisdictions
- Interface with other energy sectors (coal, oil & gas)
- Problems in enforcing their directions by both public and private entities





## **Immediate tasks**

- Improve information base
- Increase efficiency
- Expedite the introduction of OA
- Promote renewable energy
- Implement capacity building
- Improve conditions for investment in the sector
- Enforce universal service obligations with consistent QoSS
- Establish interface with environment regulators





## **End note**

- Indian regulators in different stages of evolution
- Crucial for the growth of electricity sector & achievement of MDGs
- Regional co-operation in experience sharing important. Same template may not apply.
- Need to evolve a long-term road map. As competition develops, regulation should become more light-handed
