Agreed strategy of Customs Administrations to prevent terrorist abuse of the global trading system without jeopardizing the flow of trade

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The Core Principles

> Advance electronic information

> Risk management

> Outbound inspection

> Business partnerships

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The Pillars

Pillar 1 : Customs-to-Customs

Integrated supply chain management, technology, risk management, advance information, integrity, security assessments, Customs co-operation

Pillar 2 : Customs-to-Business

Partnership, security, authorization, technology, communication and facilitation

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Objectives of the Framework of Standards

Establish standards that provide supply chain security and facilitation to goods being traded internationally

Strengthen networking arrangements between Customs administrations to improve their capability to detect high-risk consignments

Promote co-operation between the Customs and business communities

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KEY ELEMENT IN THE FRAMEWORK OF STANDARDS :

CUSTOMS CO-OPERATION AND MUTUAL RECOGNITION

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Mutual recognition of Customs control

Integrated Customs control chain ;

Consistent control and risk management standards / sharing of intelligence and risk profiles / exchange of Customs data;

Seal integrity programme ;

Mutual recognition of Authorized Economic Operator status.

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INEFFECTIVE AND INEFFICIENT TRANSIT TRANSPORT SYSTEMS ADD SIGNIFICANT COST TO INTERNATIONAL TRADE THEREBY AFFECTING THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OF A COUNTRY

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International Instruments

Article V – GATT which refers to freedom of transit of goods

Convention on the International Transport of Goods under cover of TIR Carnets (TIR Convention, 1975)

Revised Kyoto Convention (Specific Annex E, Chapter 1)

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International Conventions on Transit

Political will and sustained commitment for cooperation with neighbouring countries (joint administrative committee)

One set of international procedures rather than procedures dictated by each country

Harmonization, simplification and standardization of rules and documentation (e.g TIR Carnet, guaranteeing systems)

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KEY ELEMENT IN AN INTERNATIONAL / REGIONAL AGREEMENT ON TRANSIT :

CUSTOMS CO-OPERATION AND MUTUAL RECOGNITION

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Mutual recognition of Customs control

- Customs control measures taken in the country of departure should be accepted by the countries of transit and destination
- No examination of sealed load compartments, except special cases
- Control access to the transit system (for transport operators or guaranteeing association)
- Approval of vehicles and containers

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International Guarantee

National guaranteeing association any duties and taxes in the event of any irregularity

National guaranteeing associations form international chain

The guarantee covers all transit operations in a country irrespective whether they are carried out by national or foreign transport operators

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Other elements

- Government commitment to allow goods to transit their territories
- > Appropriate transportation infrastructure
- > Appropriate banking an insurance infrastructure
- > Appropriate information
- Communications technology and infrastructure
