Government Policy and Legislation

- Policy on outsourcing
- Road agency buy-in to change
- Road agency changes:
 - Disposition of staff and labour force
 - Disposition of agency facilities, equipment, materials
- Procurement requirements
- Funding



Private Sector Capacity

- Make-up of road contracting industry
- Technical capacity: personnel, equipment
- Financial capacity
- Consulting engineering capacity
- Relations with road agency



Other Factors

- Public sector unions in road agency
- Public perception of road service
- Enforcement of road transport regulations
- Impact on low-income employment in rural areas
- Educational institutions



How to Proceed

- Decision to proceed
- Feasibility
- Engineering and procurement
- Implementation



Feasibility

- 1. Evaluate and decide strategy
- 2. Inventory proposed roads
- 3. Establish performance standards
- 4. Preliminary quantities and cost estimates

- Evaluation of engineering options and costs
- Possibly link to road assessment management system
- Possibly include economic assessment of options

- 5. Evaluate contractor capacity
- 6. Address institutional and stakeholder issues
- 7. Agree contract implementation arrangements
- 8. TOR for design and supervision consultants
- 9. Social and environmental assessment

- Address institutional questions
- Possible donor involvement

- 10. Estimate multi-year budget requirements
- 11. Approvals

Agreement by all is essential



Engineering and Procurement

- Field investigations for detailed design 1.
- 2. Drawings, technical specifications, BOQ
- 3. Engineer's cost estimate

- Traffic, safety, emergency, environmental 4. management plans
- Procurement method and documents 5.
- Establish contract administration unit
- Procurement and approval
- Award of contract

- Detailed inventory for maintenance services
- Additional surveys and design as needed for construction works

- Consultation with contractor industry
- Road agency unit
- Supervision consultant as needed



Implementation

- 1. Initial inspection and agreement on work scope
- 2. Submission of Contractor work programme etc.
- 3. Review and approval

 Initial activities are critical to establishing effective procedures throughout contact

- 4. Contract execution
- 5. Contract administration
- 6. Monitoring and evaluation
- 7. Completion, final inspection and handing over

 External monitoring of success and/or problems



- Other PBMC road projects
- Future contracts



Pilot Project

- Recommended for addressing:
 - Road agency concerns
 - Contractor capacity
 - Performance standards and conditions of contract
 - Cost estimates
- Choose pilot roads:
 - Maintainable condition
 - Limited initial works
 - Sized to attract widespread interest
- Minimize risk to contractors:
 - Reasonable conditions of contract
 - Allow for learning curve
