
CTJ Structure

CTJ has five Country Offices:





C5+1 Platform

C5+1 is a platform that brings together the five states of Central Asia and the United States to discuss and work on issues of common concern

At the first C5+1 ministerial, held in Samarkand, Uzbekistan in November 2015, the six ministers agreed to develop regional projects to improve security, promote economic connectivity, and increase resilience against the impacts of climate change

 - Cold Chain Capacity Building: partnership, trainings

To increase the competitiveness of Central Asian economies by improving their transport and logistics sectors, the project aims to:

- Strengthen Central Asian transport and logistics services;
- Improve border crossing processes;
- Reduce legal and regulatory constraints for transport and logistics; and
- Support firms to adopt new practices, develop skills and expand business relationships

Regional Phytosanitary Challenges

- Legislation e.g. non-compliance with IPPC
- Institutional Structure, e.g. combining policy regulation and administration
- Training particularly pest risk management
- Phytosanitary certification against GOST standards
- Lack of relevant accredited laboratory testing services

- Training on phytosanitary certification against SPS standards
- Access to laboratory testing services
