



#### National Economic Council

[Law refers to "Trade Policy Committee"]

- Composed of the most Senior Level Officials
  - Chairman: the Special Representative for Trade Negotiations [USTR],

#### • Members-

- Secretaries of: State, Treasury, Defense, Attorney General, Interior, Agriculture, Commerce, Labor, Assistant to the President for Economic Affairs, Executive Director of the Council on International Economic Policy.
  - In addition, any agency or office not listed may be included when matters of interest to such agency are under consideration.

#### Duties

- Issue oriented– convened *ad hoc* at direction of Chairman or President
- Provides Recommendations and Advice to President
- Operates by Consensus

Question: What will happen, sector-by-sector, if the trade action is completed successfully?

Required by law for USTR

Conducted by US International Trade Commission

Confidential for negotiators

## Economic Effect Analysis

Question: What is the economic effect on the economy and each sector from the action that was actually completed.

Required by Law

Submitted to Congress

Available to public
